
We are Lyng Hall - Flame of Friendship

As part of the celebration, we had a past pupil, current UK Athlete, Jordan Broome.

He politely joined us to welcome the Baton's Arrival. He gave a beautiful talk about his experience within athletics towards the children for a special meet and greet afterwards.



A group of Year 7 students were charged with delivering the Flame of Friendship Baton to

our local primary school neighbours, Stoke Heath Primary. After receiving the baton, they were excited for its journey and handing it over for the relay to continue. When we arrived at Stoke Heath, we couldn't believe what we were being treated too. We had a STEM engineering day this week from the Smallpeice Trust. Over 60 pupils from year 8 explored the different ways engineers make a positive impact on the world around us. Through a series of challenges, students were able to experience different types of engineering.

Working in teams in the roles of civil and energy engineers, students were challenged to consider which elements are needed for a sustainable society. Using the

engineering life cycle, they designed and built a prototype rainwater capture system. Finally, working with software and materials engineers, they were challenged to design a piece of wearable tech which met the needs of their society.

"The day was inspiring."


"I was proud of my design for the rain water collecting system. I also learnt how different engineering is - it's not just one type. I could also improve by being a bit more outspoken"


