What is the smallest number of squares that she would need to repaint so that no two squares with a common side are painted in the same colour?



### We are Lyng Hall - Introducing the Student Leadership Council

Thirteen year 12 students have now been appointed as student leaders within our post-16 provision. This Student Leadership Council (SLC) will work alongside the existing student council to represent the school at events, lead fundraising activities and act as a student voice conduit for the school.

Of the thirteen students that applied, five were nominated by staff to stand for election for the role of Student President. Staff and students then voted electronically to democratically elect this role. The vote was very close, and all five nominees have been allocated key roles within the council. With the school already being divided into 4 colleges, members of the SLC have been allocated to roles within those colleges, except for the president and vice presidents, who remain independent:

Appointing the students at this point in the year has given us a good opportunity to establish their goals for next year as they move into year 13. The three key aims for next year are:

Charitable fundraising – the existing student council (open to anyone in school) has raised thousands of pounds for good causes in recent years and the new student leaders are keen to develop this further, as well as their own leadership skills.

International expedition – students wish to broaden their horizons and take action in the wider world. We are currently in discussion with Operation Wallacea, a charitable organisation that provides opportunities for young people to work alongside scientists in the field to undertake research and conservation activities. We hope to go to the Krka national park in Croatia in July 2025.

Develop the study culture within P16 – the student leaders know that independent study between lessons is a vital element for success in P16 study. They intend to work with all students in P16 to help develop the ways in which independent learning takes place and ensure that student voice is considered when plans are made.

I am very excited to have such a motivated group of student leaders to work with and I know they will have a significant impact on the school, which will begin as they are introduced to the rest of the school in the next college assemblies.




