

We are Lyng Hall - Maths

PET-Xi working with Year 11 Students in Maths

We have been very lucky to be given the opportunity to work with PET-Xi to support our Year 11 pupils in making excellent progress in Maths. PET-Xi work in collaboration with schools to deliver intensive, immersive and inspirational interventions designed to make a positive impact on their learners. We currently have two programmes running with PET-Xi.

The first programme involves the students who are working hard to secure a Grade 7 or above in their GCSEs. The sessions are run online during period 7 on a Monday and focus on core skills required to achieve Grade 7. The pupils are enjoying using the laptops and partaking in the sessions using a different method of learning.

The second programme involves Maths Intensive revision days aimed at supporting pupils to move from a Grade 3 to a Grade 4. The first session on January 22nd was really successful, the pupils found it really useful and many commented that although it was hard work they got a lot of out it. The day started with an assessment to see what pupils knew already, they then focused on their target areas from this in a collaborative interactive way. At the end of the day the pupils completed a post assessment, it was great to see so many scores improve.

Mrs Glancy is very proud of the pupils who are taking part in the sessions and the rest of Year 11 who are working hard to improve their grades. Her biggest piece of advice is "Just 10 minutes a night will make such a difference. Use your question level analysis to identify your key areas for development, watch Maths Genie videos on this and then complete a question or two to practice. I would love to see this work bought into school as I know a lot of you are already using this method of revision at home, please come and show me at anytime what you have been doing at home."

"Hello all! Many important things are coming up soon: the end of the first month of 2025, and some exciting opportunities for students in all years.

For our Post-16s, the school has gratefully received the bursary programme resources and are now able to provide to the many who need access to them, bolstering their education.

In addition, it's important now, as ever, for the upcoming years to be considering GCSE options - thankfully, it's not a decision that is unguided! Our teachers are dedicated to letting students know why their subjects matter and who should pick them. Some of the subject options include:

 Art: For those who want to pursue a more creative side, the GCSE AD&T course is perfect! The course covers multi-media artistic processes and allows students to cover a wide range of artists and their works, as well as producing their own pieces.



Music: The GCSE music technology course is one of Lyng Hall's
most popular and successful GCSE courses. The course involves multiple aspects of live and electronic music rendering
and production processes, allowing students to work as a
group and independently to produce music; the course is technology-oriented, so no prior musicianship or instrument skills
are necessary, which makes it easily accessible for all students.



 Psychology: One of the new subjects on our list, psychology is taught by the amazing Ms. Taylor and is an amazing option for those who want to pursue a career in developmental sport, therapeutic or criminal psychology, or who want to balance humanities and science; human behaviour contains elements of both! Here's an excerpt about how the course is examined from the dossier on subject preferences:

"Psychology is assessed by two exams of 1 hour 45 each at the end of the course. There is no course work but you will be given tasks to complete for practice during the two years as well as mock exams and end of unit tests."

Hello everybody and welcome back from Pegasus for the new year, as we embark on a new term, it is essential to reflect on our shared responsibility in fostering a positive school environment for everyone, not just fellow Pegasus pupils. This month, we want to focus particularly on improving individual behaviours among our pupils, with a spotlight on Pegasus year 8 and great acknowledgments to 7M, 10I, and those exceptional individuals demonstrating commendable behaviour across our school.

Spotlight: Working Towards Improvement

We recognize that all classes have their unique dynamics, and the Pegasus group in Year 8 is no exception. While every member of our community has the potential to shine, recent feedback suggests some behaviours could be more aligned with our school values. By engaging in open conversations and setting clear expectations, we believe that every student can contribute to making Pegasus year 8 a model class of respect and responsibility and this needs to start from now. There are only a small proportion of pupils who are massively effecting the outcomes of this group.

To support these efforts, we encourage students to embrace our core values: respect, responsibility, and **resilience**. Small daily choices—like showing respect to peers and teachers, being responsible for your own behaviours, and demonstrating resilience in the face of challenges—can lead to significant changes. We will be implementing regular discussions during P1 aimed at developing these traits more deeply within the class.

Celebrating 7M and 10I: Exemplifying School Values

In contrast, we would like to take a moment to celebrate our 7M and 10I classes for their outstanding commitment to individual behaviours. These classes have consistently shown respect for their environment, their peers, and their teachers. It is heartening to witness students stepping up as role models, whether it's through their engagements in class, their interactions during breaks, or how they embody school spirit at various events.
